SERMON TEXT SUGGESTION:

You may want to add Luke 18:9-14 into your sermon... The Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector

⁹To some who were confident of their own righteousness and looked down on everyone else, Jesus told this parable: ¹⁰ "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. ¹¹The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. ¹²I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.'

¹³ "But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'

¹⁴ "I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

DYING MOMENTS/PRACTICING FORGIVENESS: (this is only printed on the leader's paper)

We all are imperfect. We all wish we could take back words that we have said in anger, or times when we were so focused on ourselves that our words or actions brought sadness or grief to someone else. We all fall short, in living lives that are far from the life of the One that we say that we follow, the One whose name we bare...Jesus the Christ.

Some have been convicted of a wrong-doing, and have been a part of our judicial system's "corrections" where often they have endured more demeaning, hurtful, often dehumanizing assaults that are greater than the wrong that they had committed. Some of us have committed wrongs of judging others, before and after a person has been involved with the judicial system...sometimes our judgement has come to others who have never been formally charged, but we feel that they have sinned, and so we treat them and speak to them as though they are less then, unworthy. Sometimes our judgments, our sins are a lashing out towards another, to help us feel justified, "better than" someone else. God, you tell us to "judge not, least we be judged." (Matt 7:1-2) Help us hear your words.

Some of us have buried sins that we have lived with most of our lives, deep within our hearts. We don't speak of them, we don't deal with them. Sometimes we just feel dirty, even when we have asked God to forgive us...we don't believe that Jesus' sacrifice, God's grace is sufficient for our sin to be washed away, for us to become as clean as snow. And not believing in God's power and grace, we commit another sin, a sin of disbelief, a sin of limiting God and God's power.

Whatever your sin or sins are, you are now invited to write your sin on the paper that you either picked up as you entered the sanctuary or pick one up as you enter the chancel area. When you are up front, follow the example of the Pastor and those who have led worship today, and pray for forgiveness, and then burn the paper, symbolizing the death of the sin, to you, as it disappears into ashes. If you would like to receive an anointing of oil following the death of your sin, you may receive the anointing and then return to your seat.
