## New Life in a Legacy Ministry: Cityview's Growing Ministry with Adults with Disabilities Every Sunday, like clockwork, Laurie, a member of our church, sees me, yells my name—and I naturally echo

back hers—and then we high five. The energy and excitement are unmatched and are a highlight of my week. It's one of the many reasons I love serving at Cityview. The members of our ministry to adults with disabilities are a constant reminder of what church is all about: the joy of connection, the beauty of relationships, and the image of God revealed in each of us, in diverse, beautiful ways.

Cityview UMC inherited a beautiful ministry when Central City Church (a new church start) and St. Luke's (an established congregation) merged. For decades, St. Luke's had been a spiritual home for adults with disabilities,

and their commitment to this ministry remained nonnegotiable throughout the merger. Central City was eager to meet this requirement, so after the merger, we began dreaming how we might revitalize this ministry.

Over the years, this Sunday school class had grown smaller as members aged or moved away. We knew we wanted to remain committed to this essential ministry—we just weren't yet sure how to revitalize it. How do we reimagine a legacy ministry, simultaneously preserving what was and dreaming up what could be? It's a challenge many churches face.

That's when our Associate Pastor suggested we invite Delanie Ray to become the new director of what would soon be known as *City Friends*. Delanie had already developed genuine friendships within the class and a natural connection, and our Associate Pastor believed they would do well leading the ministry.

That's when I sat down with Delanie.

"Would you consider leading our ministry to adults with disabilities?" I asked them.

Delanie remembers that conversation, saying later, "I never imagined myself leading a ministry for adults with disabilities, but at that moment, I didn't need to pray about it. God told me right then and there that this was my calling."

After they started, we began dreaming about how we might revitalize the ministry. One of Cityview's core values is collaboration, and Delanie took that to heart. They met with local organizations working with adults with disabilities—from a local art studio to the Friends and Family Network (FFN), which now uses our facility weekly for classes and community events.

Then we met with Goodwill's day program through a connection they had with the FFN. They were excited about the idea of having their members come to the church during the week for programming. As Delanie would later explain,

"It gives the folks a third space to hang out and feel safe that isn't at the Goodwill hub. It gives them a chance to meet new people that come and volunteer from Cityview and from the community at large."

Thanks to Delanie's leadership, Goodwill now brings groups to Cityview every Wednesday afternoon. Dozens of adults come through our doors each week to enjoy programming, a hot meal, music, drum circles, a caring community, and more. Some Goodwill staff have even found a home at Cityview as a result.

As Delanie's passion grew, so did their calling, and Goodwill eventually hired them part-time, then full-time. Thankfully, Delanie continued to serve part-time at Cityview, overseeing our disability ministry and Sunday morning program. Delanie describes their calling this way:

"I've always known my calling has a lot to do with helping others... but I've learned that more than just doing things for others, this call is about instilling agency and self-advocacy. This population has often been infantilized and treated like they don't matter. I believe God has called me into this ministry to show others what folks with disabilities can teach us—and to show them that they belong.

"'Being' is much more important than 'doing.' It really changes our perspective in a society that always needs us to be accomplishing something. A lot of the time, just sitting and chatting is the most important thing."

Disability ministry, like any ministry, thrives when a calling is given room to thrive, and where collaboration and possibilities are louder than scarcity and discouragement. Sometimes people discover their passion only after someone else notices their gifts and extends an invitation. Delanie didn't seek out disability ministry—it found them through relationship, affirmation, and the simple power of someone saying, "You'd be great at this."

I'm glad we have someone to provide space not only for Laurie but also for all those looking for connection. I know my Sundays and Wednesdays wouldn't be the same without the excitement and energy of our ministry to adults with disabilities. Joe Graves, Lead Pastor
