Beloved Mahoning Valley United Methodists,

Thank you for the privilege and honor of being your district superintendent for this six year season. Thank you for the lessons you have taught me and the grace you have offered me. Thank you for inspiring me with your scrappiness, your courage, and the

amazement of witnessing what God can do through you! Thank you for taking risks and for not giving up. Thank you for your deep love of Jesus and your desire to know and love him more. Thank you for sharing Jesus with your neighbors and for inviting me in.

I have prayed many prayers for us since 2017, and I will continue to pray for you after I transition back to the local church. I am going to lift up one more in farewell: I pray that you will not make such an idol of the past that you are unable to see, let alone follow, where Christ calls into the future.

It is necessary to know and try to understand history. Much of the Bible is the past record of God's mighty acts! It is good to remember with fondness times and people of joy, love, and peace. We join in the communion of saints through rituals that reach back through all of Christianity. Building on the knowledge of the past is how humanity progresses technologically and morally. We are Christians because the faith has been handed down through the ages.

But: if we are so enamored of the past that our goal becomes trying to recreate it, we limit what God can do with us. Time marches on and the past is not coming back. If you wonder where the young people are today, they are not in the decades before they were born. So if we are doing exactly the same things in the church that we did a few decades ago, or doing nothing because things are not how they were a few decades ago, we may well be refusing to let God work through us now. God may indeed have planned a "future with hope" as in the oft-quoted Jeremiah 29:11, but we will never see it if we are fixated on the past. Trying to recreate or remain in the past makes the past an idol. It sets nostalgia in the place of God. It reveals a view of God as an aging athlete, whose performance has peaked but who's still in the game. To act as though our mission is to recreate the past rather than follow Christ into the future is to undercut our beliefs that God works all things together for good, that God is making all things new, that God has the power to keep working out the divine will.

If you're feeling angry or afraid right now, go back and re-read paragraph 3. I am not praying for you to forget or ignore the past. I am praying for all those experiences and lessons of God caring for you, loving us, and guiding humanity; to "turn your eyes upon Jesus", to help you to open up to what God might want to do among you now, to trust that God is at work bringing about deep shalom and calling all people to live according to the teachings and example of Christ. I am praying for you to catch a glimpse of God's big dreams for the future, to see how God is at work in the here and now, and to trust that the God of the past also goes with us into the future. I am not saying that one generation is better or more important than another. I am praying that all generations would find welcome in our churches, and that all generations would be able to love, care for, honor, inspire, teach, and learn from each other as we journey towards Jesus together.





Living the Kin-dom: Exploring the Lord's Prayer as a Spiritual Practice for Social Transformation by Riva Tabelisma. Rev. Robin Dillon will return as a study leader and is joined by Rev Dr. Lisa Withrow who most recently was the Finding Peace study leader in 2021.

Jesus' teachings in the Gospels proclaim the good news of the kin-dom or reign (basileia) of God. In fact, Jesus mentions the kin-dom 90 times in the Synoptic Gospels! What does the Bible tell us about God's basileia and why do we call it the kin-dom? For Jesus, the kin-dom was not simply something to talk about but something we could live and experience. From the Lord's Prayer to the beatitudes to the parables, this good news is at the heart of Jesus' preaching, teaching and ministry.

Come! Let's explore together the heart of Jesus' good news and what fresh vision it offers us as we seek to be in mission today. Attendees do not need to be from your church or even United Methodist.

Remember that the Youth and Children's studies are independent, meaty and fun events—not just tag-alongs for your children and grandchildren.
